

EU and Council Negotiators agree on an EU Anti-Coercion Instrument

The European Parliament, the Council and the European Commission made critical progress on an EU Anti-Coercion Instrument. This instrument is meant to deter countries from restricting or threatening to restrict trade or investment to bring about a change of policy in the EU. It is designed to de-escalate and induce the discontinuation of specific coercive measures through dialogue as a first step. Any countermeasures the EU took would be applied only as a last resort. The provisional Agreement between the European Parliament, the Council and the European Commission states which determines whether the EU or a Member State is the target of economic coercion and the list of possible countermeasures.

The co-legislators also found a balance around other significant outstanding elements, such as reparations, timeframes for EU action under the instrument, and overall institutional compensation.

Work continues technically to reach a political conclusion in a final trialogue. Once the text is finalised, the European Parliament and the Council must adopt the new Regulation before it can enter into force.

EU Biosecurity, Veterinary Affairs Update

Update to EU AFS rules

African swine fever is a viral disease that can devastate livestock and crops. Commission Implementing Regulation (EU) 2021/605 mandates disease control in restricted zones I, II, and III. Since Implementing Regulation (EU) 2023/506 was adopted, Italy and Poland have seen many outbreaks of African swine fever in wild porcine animals. The epidemiological condition in restricted zones I, II, and III have improved. Recent outbreaks of African swine fever in wild porcine animals in Italy and Poland should be reflected in Annex I to Implementing Regulation (EU) 2021/605. Due to the epidemiological condition, particular Polish zones should be identified as restricted zone I. While wild porcine animals still have African swine fever, restricted zones I and III in Poland and Slovakia should be de-listed. Bulgaria, Italy, Poland, and Slovakia should establish large African swine fever-free zones. Implementing Regulation (EU) 2021/605 immediately modifies Annex I.

Food fraud: Commission publishes guidance on fighting fraudulent and deceptive practices in the agri-food chain

The Commission released a report from a project to gather data on possible fraud risks identified by Member State authorities and control techniques to identify dishonest and fraudulent actions in the agri-food chain. As it collects examples of best practices and discusses the difficulties they encounter while putting fraud-related controls in place, this paper is anticipated to be utilised by the authorities in charge of official rules in the Member States. Between 2020 and 2022, eight Member States participated in pilot and fact-finding investigations that provided the data for the paper. The article discusses the potential, problems, and instances of successful implementation of Article 9(2) of Regulation (EU) 2017/625. The competent authorities of Member States are obligated to identify deliberate violations of the regulations regulating the agri-food chain in that operators commit dishonest tactics to obtain an unfair advantage. In 2019, food theft was predicted to cost the world 30 billion euros annually.

EU Customs Value Updates

Adjustment Authorisation (AJ)

French customs have informed operators that as of April 1, 2023, customs value adjustment (AJ) authorisations will be entirely issued in the European customs authorisation management portal Trader Portal - Customs Decisions System (TP-CDS). Therefore, the changeover of AJs in TP-CDS does not impact AJs valid on April 1, 2023. Operators can refer to note no—22000475 of 29/12/2022 relating to the change of AJs in TP-CDS in the appendix to this sheet. Under Article 73 of the UCC, customs authorities can issue an authorisation for adjustment (AJ) when some aspects of the transaction value are not quantifiable during customs clearance. In addition to items to be added or

deducted following Articles 71 and 72, the UCC allows the issuance of an AJ for amounts to be included under Article 70.2 UCC. Thus, it is possible to file an AJ request when the price is subject to variation (up or down) after customs clearance or in the event of additional payments a posteriori.

EU announces revocation of BTI after WCO decision

EU Chief discusses EU Policy on China - Read What She Had To Say - Our Summary

President von der Leyen's lecture on EU-China ties at the Mercator Institute for China Studies and the European Policy Centre highlighted China's strategic hardening and rising assertiveness.

China is using Putin's vulnerability to gain influence over Russia, reversing the power balance. President Xi's farewell to Putin on the Kremlin steps highlighted 100 years of transformation.

China has also used deception and economic and commercial pressure to force other nations to cooperate. These measures include boycotts of apparel labels for speaking out on human rights, penalties on European Parliament members, authorities, and academic institutions, and limits on Australian barley and wine exports owing to its government's doubts about COVID-19's origin. These strategies utilise interdependence and economic clout to achieve what China wants from smaller nations. The most crucial part of this essay is that China is transitioning from reform and openness to security and control. This involves increased security, tech, and economic measures, more robust financial control, and an effort to make China less reliant on the world and the world more dependent on China.

President Xi has vowed to make the Chinese military a "great wall of steel that effectively preserves national sovereignty, security, and development interests," Beijing's Global Security Initiative tries to integrate it into UN resolutions and international discourse. China must strengthen worldwide industrial chains' dependency on China to create a formidable countermeasure and deterrence. Chinese companies are already required to support state intelligence-gathering activities and keep them secret. China's centrality in the international order is the CCP's ambition. Its roles in multilateral organisations like the Belt and Road Initiative, new international banks, and global efforts like the Saudi Arabia-Iran accord and the Moscow exhibition of goodwill demonstrate this. These statements show its desire to build an alternate global order in which national security and economics trump political and civil rights.

The Belt and Road Initiative, new international banks, global efforts like the Saudi Arabia-Iran accord and the Moscow exhibition of goodwill demonstrate this. The most crucial points in this book are that the EU must enhance the international system and maintain diplomatic stability and open dialogue with China. The EU and President Macron will visit Beijing shortly because decoupling from China isn't feasible or beneficial for Europe. They must explore more ambitious cooperation and fairer, more disciplined competition. They must also consider collaborating constructively in the global system and on particular issues.

China and the EU collaborated on climate change and wildlife conservation, and they want to continue doing so before COP28 later this year. Diplomacy works when interests match. The European Union's future China strategy's four pillars are essential in this text. They include making our economy and industry more competitive and robust, effectively employing our trade instruments, creating new defensive mechanisms for vital sectors, coordinating with other partners, and investing in infrastructure in the area and beyond. These four pillars will increase our supply chain resilience and diversify our trade, which is critical to the European Union's economic de-risking plan.

This means making our economy and industry more competitive and robust, effectively employing our trade instruments, establishing new defensive mechanisms for specific essential sectors, coordinating with other partners, and investing in infrastructure in the area and beyond. As a result, our supply chain resilience and trade diversification will improve.

UK to join the CPTPP

The UK announced it would join the Comprehensive and Progressive Agreement for Trans-Pacific Partnership (CPTPP), an Indo-Pacific free trade area of 11 countries and £9 trillion in GDP in 2021. The UK is the first European member.

After the UK joins, the 12 countries will have 500 million people and 15% of the global GDP.

UK exports to CPTPP countries and imports into the UK from CPTPP countries will be tariff-free.

The benefits include:

- cutting tariffs on goods exports
- · new opportunities from diversifying supply chains
- · opening new markets for UK service providers
- improved data flows
- · a trade deal with Malaysia for the first time
- more access to high-quality consumer goods
- strengthening economic security
- · encouraging investment

Changes to the Guide on classifying drones and aircraft parts for import and export

Get help organising drones and aircraft parts for import and export. Guidance on headings 8806 and 8807 has been added. In addition, heading 8807 has replaced heading 8803.

Changes to the Guide on classifying tobacco for import and export

Get help organising cigarettes, cigars, raw tobacco, smoking tobacco, tobacco for heating and nicotine substitutes for import and export. Updated to reflect the impact of new heading 2404 and two related new notes to chapter 24.

Changes to the guide on classifying electrical equipment for import and export

Get help classifying electrical equipment such as communication equipment, cameras, and their parts and accessories. Plastic Packaging Tax updates

As announced in the Spring Budget, from 1 April 2023, the Plastic Packaging Tax (PPT) rate will be increased from £200 per tonne to £210.82 per tonne.

Price Index (CPI). This change will maintain the real-term value of the price incentive to use recycled plastic and supports the government's environmental goals. The new rate will apply to all plastic packaging manufactured or imported into the UK on or after 1 April 2023. Any packaging manufactured or imported before 1 April 2023 will be charged at the current rate of £200 per tonne.

TRA to review imports of steel ropes and cables from China

The TRA has launched a transition review into anti-dumping measures on steel ropes and cables from China, including those products consigned from Morocco and Korea.

UK Trade Policy Update

UK removes trade obstacles worth £2.2 billion

The UK states that the government has removed trade obstacles to markets worth more than £2.2 billion to UK firms, or more than £11 million per day. However, British exporters often run against roadblocks of all shapes and sizes, including red tape, restrictions, and bureaucracy, which prevent them from exporting overseas. By collaborating with countries all across the globe to identify and address the problems, the UK has assembled a worldwide network of experts trying to eliminate them. The following have been successfully targeted in the previous 200 days:

- Removing Nepal's restriction on the import of high-end goods, including toys, diamonds, and colour Televisions.
- · Lowering the registration requirements for drugs going to Vietnam.
- Lowering the limit on foreign investment in renewable energy projects in the Philippines, enabling UK businesses to finance the growth of solar, hydro, tidal, and wind energy.
- Ensuring that British educators who want to teach in Thailand may do so with acknowledgement of their credentials.
- Removing the export restrictions on bacon, gammon, and pig sausages to South Korea.
- · Approving Chile's import of pet food.
- The City of Glasgow College benefits from allowing instructors from West Java, Indonesia, to complete maritime training programmes in the UK if the UK maritime qualification criteria are accepted.
- Assisting businesses to obtain financial services in Mauritius and fostering the further expansion of the local financial sector.
- Regulations like the price threshold for selling used mobile phones to Turkey are being reviewed.
- Granting access to the Brazilian market to certifying firms and hastening clearance procedures in the car industry.

NCTS Phase 5: new functionality to draft, save, retrieve and amend

NCTS5 will provide new and enhanced functionality to improve your user experience. This includes the:

- · Ability to amend pre-lodged declarations to avoid having to cancel and re-submit
- Introduction of a digital Transit Accompanying Document (TAD) so the paper document does not need to be carried with the goods
- 'Office of Incident' role, which can be carried out at customs locations that have that role assigned to them in their EU Customs Office List (COL) profile

HMRC explains in their latest newsletter how to amend pre-lodged declarations using third-party software or the updated free-to-use web portal for NCTS5:

- The Common Transit Convention allows you to pre-lodge a declaration up to 30 days before
 the move. However, you cannot currently amend a pre-lodged declaration.NCTS5 will enable
 declarants to amend pre-lodged declarations after they've been submitted.
- If you need to amend, you can go back into the declaration and make changes without starting a new one.
- This new function will be available to anyone using third-party software from 16 November 2023. For those who use the NCTS web portal, this will be available by Q3 2024.
- To support our web portal users until then, we're introducing a new draft declarations feature.
- From 16 November 2023, the NCTS web portal will allow you to save and amend your departure declarations for up to 31 days before submitting them.
- If you're waiting for information, such as an EORI number, you can draft your order, save it, and then amend and submit it later.
- This feature will allow you to draft and amend multiple declarations simultaneously. You will have 31 days after starting a declaration to submit it.
- You can view how many days you have left to submit each draft.
- When you can amend or submit a declaration, search for it using its local reference number (LRN).

UK VAT Changes

Details of deliberate tax defaulters

The current list of people who deliberately got their tax affairs wrong. HMRC publish details of deliberate tax defaulters, and these are people who have received penalties either for:

- intentional errors in their tax returns
- · deliberately failing to comply with their tax obligations
- The law that allows this is section 94 Finance Act 2009.

We may publish information about a deliberate tax defaulter where:

- we have carried out an investigation, and the person has been charged one or more penalties for willful defaults
- those penalties involve tax of more than £25,000

Their information will not be published if the person earns the maximum penalty reduction by fully disclosing the default details.

HMRC will publish enough information to identify the following:

- · deliberate tax defaulter
- · penalties imposed for their willful defaults
- amount of tax on which those penalties are for

A penalty becomes final on either of the:

- day after the end of the appeal period if the person does not make an appeal
- · date when a request is finally determined
- · date when a contract settlement is made

Imports into GB: Clarification of legislation for Additional Declarations on Phytosanitary Certificates

GB requires that Phytosanitary Certificates (PCs) be issued for imported regulated plants and plant products, indicating they are free from pests and disease. Special requirements in the GB Plant Health Regulations dictate whether Additional Declarations (ADs) need to be included on the PC. ADs are statements added to the PC in the relevant section to provide specific additional information. The AD should consist of the full wording of the requirement, including references to the full title of the legislation, the applicable Annex and the point. The legislation that traders should be referencing is 'Annex 7 to the retained Phytosanitary Conditions Regulation (2019/2072)' To familiarise yourself with the format of ADs, please refer to the up-to-date guidance on the Plant Health Portal.

United States

ACE: Features Changes Update

US Customs and Border Protection changed the Automated Commercial Environment capabilities delivery date. ACE capabilities, including data reports, help importers save duty and comply.

Portal ACE

Reference tab changes, edit capabilities for all account types' account data, user access control, blanket declarations, and facility and FTZ document upload/management are expected this summer. Additionally, statements, modification history, conveyance template uploads, and vessel agent (new account type) will be transferred in the last phase between March and June.

HTS

The complete Harmonized Tariff Schedule administrative user interface, HTS enquiry, and data conversion will migrate on May 16.

Drawback

Drawback entries/claims (entry type 47) will be bulk liquidated on May 23. Filers will use a new indicator to identify whether they are making a replacement or direct identification claim under drawback sections 56 and 70 of the U.S.-Mexico-Canada Agreement. CBP has not changed its indication timeframe.

Entry summary

Entry summary query updates will convert the query from old ACE to new ACE and add data items from collections on October 14

Aluminum

On April 10, CBP will begin collecting five additional ACE data components in response to a 200 per cent increase in Section 232 penalties on Russian aluminium imports. Aluminium is melted or cast at these locations. In addition, August saw updates to the entry summary user interface created/edited for non-ABI items, and May 23 will see bulk processing enhancements.

UFLPA

On March 18, the Uyghur Forced Labor Prevention Act issued a new area warning. The three new validations are (1) postal code is a necessary field, (2) users will get an error message if the postal code supplied is not a legitimate Chinese postal code, and (3) users will receive a warning if an Uyghur region postal code is submitted. China-origin entries and manufacturer identification code production for commerce and CBP users need these validations. In May, CBP will automate UFLPA detention exception petitions and admissibility reviews. This will entail automating the filling out and distributing CBP form 6051D and attachment 2B and creating a public website where the trade may post documents for CBP assessment. CBP can monitor, evaluate, and make final dispositions.

Landing Statement

June 4 will discharge maritime freight at the lowest shipping level. This will also provide container goods station operators with a new user interface to see shipment-level data.

Collections

On October 14, technology will be deployed to automate the budget clearing account procedure, improve open receivables reconciliation, integrate port collections into ACE collections, and centralise the entry lifecycle.

Currencies

Functionality that offers transparent, brief daily exchange rates to convert invoice amounts to U.S. dollars for entry summary and other usage has been postponed until May.

Instant delivery

Filers may still submit ID requests on entries and complete out ACE Cargo Release and Entry Summary in September.

SEACATS

The Automated Surety Interface Seized Assets, and Case Tracking System (ACS) will switch to ACE on May 6.

Truck manifests

ACE Truck Manifest will use travel documents for all crew members and passengers in the conveyance at the crossing to establish the entrance class in July. CBP has also introduced non-intrusive inspection capabilities, such as artificial intelligence/machine learning models for ACE truck manifest modernisation, which will be deployed in August.

Paraguayan Fresh Beef Imports Allowed

The Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service proposes allowing Paraguayan fresh (chilled or frozen) beef to be imported under the same circumstances as Uruguayan beef and ovine meat and fresh beef from Argentina and Brazil's exporting areas Comments are due April 26. Since 1997, USDA has banned fresh meat from Paraguay due to its flawed food safety inspection system for raw beef products. However, APHIS believes that importing fresh beef from Paraguay is low risk and that the nation can report, control, and eliminate the footand-mouth disease. APHIS also found that Paraguay can meet U.S. import limits on concerned items.

US Trade & FTA Policy

United States and Japan Sign Critical Minerals Agreement

The historic Agreement will diversify key supply chains and strengthen the U.S.-Japan bilateral economic and trade relationship. The Agreement builds on the 2019 U.S.-Japan Trade Agreement and will support and diversify critical minerals supply chains and promote the adoption of electric vehicle battery technologies. In particular, the Agreement memorialises the shared commitment of the United States and Japan concerning the critical minerals sector to facilitate trade, promote fair competition and market-oriented conditions for trade in critical minerals, advance robust labor and environmental standards, and cooperate in efforts to ensure secure, transparent, sustainable, and equitable critical minerals supply chains. In addition, the Agreement establishes several new commitments and areas for joint cooperation regarding electric vehicle battery critical minerals supply chains between the United States and Japan, including those related to:

- Non-imposition of export duties on critical minerals;
- Domestic measures to address non-market policies and practices of other countries affecting trade in critical minerals;
- Best practices regarding review of investments within their territories in the critical minerals sector by foreign entities;
- Measures that promote more resource efficient and circular economy approaches to reduce the demand for, and environmental impact of, virgin material extraction and related processes;
- Engagement, information-sharing, and enforcement actions related to labor rights in critical minerals extraction and processing;
- Remedying violations of labor rights at entities connected to critical minerals supply chains.

The Agreement entered into force immediately upon signature.

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US Export Controls

DDTC/State Updates Open Generic License Pilot Program in Australia, California, and the UK; Validity Extended to 2026

Two open general licences were granted on July 13, 2022, by the Department of State's Directorate of Defense Trade Controls (DDTC) following a pilot programme for the International Traffic in Arms Regulations (ITAR), 22 C.F.R. sections 120–130, 120.22. (b). These open general licences were initially released with a July 31, 2023, expiration date. The new permits will run out on July 21, 2026. Both the open general licences and the revised citations for the mentioned ITAR sections that have subsequently relocated have been updated by DDTC. For DDTC to gather enough information to evaluate the value of the Open General License pilot programme and to give the industry enough assurance that they can rely on the open general licences without worrying that they might expire more quickly than a standard licence, it was necessary to extend the available general licences' validity period by three years. In addition, further non-substantive changes have been made to both open general licences by DDTC to clarify that only one defence item may be reexported or transferred at a time, rather than multiple defence articles needing to be done so concurrently. This is a link to the most recent version of each open general licence. The Department will issue a Federal Register notice soon to better notify the public of this extension.

Thirty-two new entities have unconfirmed export restrictions.

- A March 24 BIS final regulation added 32 foreigners to the Unverified list. Fourteen are in China; five are in the UAE; four are in Turkey; two are in Germany; one is in Bulgaria, Canada, Indonesia, Israel, Malaysia, Saudi Arabia, and Singapore; and two are in the UAE. This law prohibits licencing exceptions for some persons' exports, reexports, and transfers (within the nation).
- Exporters, reexporters, and transferors of commodities to individuals covered by the Export Administration Rules but do not require a licence must also acquire and preserve a UVL statement from them.
- These parties must report all EAR-covered tangible exports to the Automated Export System.
- The UVL lists the names and addresses of foreign parties whose bona fides (i.e., legitimacy
 and dependability relating to the end-use and end-user of items subject to the EAR) BIS was
 unable to verify through an end-use check, such as when the foreign party cannot be located
 at the address listed on export documents or when a recognisably foreign party is involved
 during a check.
- If there is insufficient data to include an entity in the UVL, BIS may consist of a person.

US Sanctions

Global Magnitsky Sanctions Amends

OFAC is issuing Global Magnitsky General License 7, "Authorising Certain Transactions Involving Tabacalera del Este S.A. or Tabacos USA Inc. Under the Tobacco Master Settlement Agreement." In addition, OFAC is also issuing one Global Magnitsky-related Frequently Asked Question (1121).

Settlement Agreement between the OFAC and Uphold HQ Inc.

OFAC announced a settlement with Uphold HQ Inc. ("Uphold"). Uphold agreed to remit \$72,230.32 to settle its potential civil liability for apparent sanctions violations against Iran, Cuba, and Venezuela. Between March 2017 and May 2022, Uphold or its affiliates processed 152 transactions totalling \$180,575.80 in clear violation of OFAC's sanctions against Iran, Cuba, and Venezuela. These apparent violations included processing transactions for customers who self-identified as being located in Iran or Cuba and for employees of the Government of Venezuela. The settlement amount reflects OFAC's determination that Uphold's apparent violations were non-egregious and voluntarily self-disclosed. For more information, please visit the following web notice.

Settlement Agreement between the OFAC and Wells Fargo Bank, N.A. ("Wells Fargo")

The U.S. Department of the Treasury's Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) today announced a <u>settlement</u> with Wells Fargo Bank, N.A. ("Wells Fargo"). Wells Fargo agreed to remit \$30,000,000 to settle its potential civil liability for apparent sanctions violations against Iran, Syria, and Sudan. For about seven years, beginning in 2008 and ending in 2015, Wells Fargo and its predecessor, Wachovia Bank ("Wachovia"), provided a foreign bank located in Europe with software that the foreign bank then used to process trade finance transactions with U.S.-sanctioned jurisdictions and persons. In addition, Wachovia, at the direction of a mid-level manager, customised a trade insourcing software platform for general use by the European bank that Wachovia knew or should have known would involve engaging in trade-finance transactions with sanctioned jurisdictions and persons. Issuance of Amended Russia-related Frequently Asked Question

Treasury Sanctions Facilitator for Attempted Arms Deals Between North Korea and Russia

OFAC sanctioned one individual for attempting to facilitate arms deals between Russia and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK). Sanctions and export controls imposed by a coalition of over 30 countries have constrained Russia's ability to replace lost military equipment and supplies with modern technology. At the same time, the United States and its partners continue to provide Ukraine with advanced weapons to defend itself against Russia's brutal war of choice. Press release

Belarus Sanctions Regulations Amended

The Belarus Sanctions Rules have been updated and reprinted by OFAC to comply with Executive Order 14038 of August 9, 2021. The definitions, general licences, and interpretive advice in these rules, which took effect on March 27, have all been updated, and new definitions have been added. EO 14038 prohibits specific individuals from having any property or interests in property in the United States, coming into the United States, or being in the ownership or control of any American (e.g., government leaders, those operating in identified economic sectors, and those involved in human rights violations, electoral fraud, corruption, or U.S. sanctions evasion).

Treasury Sanctions Syrian Government and Lebanese Drug Traffickers

OFAC designated major persons who assist Syrian President Bashar al-Assad (al-Assad) and the manufacturing or shipment of the hazardous amphetamine Captagon in coordination with the UK. Captagon trafficking is estimated to be a billion-dollar business. These designations, some of which comply with the Caesar Syrian Civilian Protection Act of 2019 (the "Caesar Act"), also highlight the role Lebanese drug traffickers, some of whom have links to Hizballah, have played in Captagon exports. This lawsuit also reveals the al-Assad family's role in cocaine trafficking and Syrian government funding. Press release

WCO

WCO Chief discusses trade's future at the ICC Conference

Dr Kunio Mikuriya, Secretary General of the World Customs Organization (WCO), presented at the ICC Future Trade Summit in Singapore on March 30, 2023, at the request of the International Chamber of Commerce (ICC), about WCO projects with data and technology.

Dr Mikuriya highlighted WCO standards that promote trade transparency and predictability after being welcomed by Mr John Denton, Secretary General of the ICC. He also discussed how technology might help the intellectual growth of a digitalised trading system. Although supporting and promoting private sector attempts to standardise trade data, including the Digital Standards Initiative backed by the ICC, he urged examining the adoption of the WCO Data Model as a foundation for such activities. This would be a quality product by the standards of the standards.

Press Release

The Harmonized System Committee's 71st session was successfully ended.

The 71st Session of the Harmonized System Committee has successfully concluded.

The agenda for HSC 71 was pervasive, with ninety-one topics that dealt with categorisation concerns, proposed Nomenclature modifications, and important policy issues. This was due to a backlog of difficulties brought on by the loss of a full Committee meeting at the start of the pandemic, which resulted from three years of HSC sessions that lasted around three hours each time.

As a result, 30 new classification judgements, 462 INN classifications, 23 new classification views, and 18 amendments to the HS2027 Nomenclature and HS2022 Explanatory Notes were all finalised and accepted by the Committee.
